KMUW community investment pays off

KMUW's recent expansion of local services is paying off in the form of statewide recognition in 13 areas of journalism and outreach from the Kansas Association of Broadcasters. The most prestigious of the awards is for Kansas major market "Radio Station of the Year," for the second year in a row. In the past nine months, KMUW 89.1 has increased news staff from three reporters to six reporters to tell the stories of Wichita. The station has also created an Engagement Department in anticipation of moving the radio station to Old Town and getting even more involved in community conversations.

The honors from KAB are in several areas, including Feature Enterprise Reporting, where Wichita's NPR station swept all three places, 1st, 2nd and Honorable Mention! Other areas of recognition are Editorial Commentary, Public Service Announcements, Spot News Coverage, Public Service and Music DJ's. Some of the winners' names are quite familiar to regular NPR listeners, including Carla Eckels, Aileen LeBlanc, Chris Heim, Sean Sandefur, Abigail Wilson, Deborah Shaar and Kate Clause.

General Manager Debra Fraser says, "KMUW is investing in Wichita and moving to Old Town to engage the community in matters important to Wichitans. So far, it's working. Plus, we have much more planned in the coming year. We want to help make Wichita one of the best places to live, work and play!"
