

#### BY THE NUMBERS

This fall 2,450 students were enrolled in the College of Applied Studies of that 1,743 were undergraduate students and 707 were graduate students.

The largest department remains the School of Education (SOE) with 1411 students, followed by Human Performance Studies (HPS), Counseling, Educational Leadership, Educational and School Psychology (CLES) and Sport Management (SMGT) respectively.



## STUDENT RECOGNITION

Senior Honor is one of the most prestigious honors a WSU student can receive. Students are selected based on commitment to academic excellence, involvement on campus and in the community, academic standing and oral and written communication skills. 
