Library Module: Library Research – Phase 1: Exploring and Developing Research Questions

Research for this class provides additional context for understanding the big question of humanity – What is it? How do we get it?

This module will take place in phases throughout the second part of the semester. You will learn about library resources, develop a research question, track your research findings, and share your research process and conclusions in a presentation to a small group.

- Empathy and the brain
- Technology and emotions

As a group, discuss how <u>at least two</u> of these topics related to the big questions: What does it mean to be human? What leads us to be more or less humane? Make some notes below:
