FACULTY UPDATES



Dr. Dinorah Azpuru - Dr. Azpuru had a busy summer doing research. She was invited as a panelist at a Seminar at Florida International University in May, and went to Washington D.C. in June to work in a multidisciplinary research project she is engaged in. She also completed her most recent research on Guatemala's political culture as part of the Latin American Public Opinion Project. She is looking forward to teaching Senior Seminar twice a year for the first time, which will allow the Department to have smaller groups of students and thus work more closely with them on their research papers.

Dr. Ken Ciboski— Dr. Ciboski continues to be a frequent commentator on local, state and national politics for the print and electronic media, and he continues to present on political matters for local organizations. He appears frequently on "Kansas Week", which is aired state-wide to discuss political developments. SPOTLIGHT ON DEPARTMENT SCHOLARSHIPS

The Political Science Department is grateful to those alumni and friends of the department who have endowed nine scholarships and contribute to the Annual Fund that provides additional scholarship funding. Below, we want to share the background on several of our endowed scholarships.

D.J. AND TERRY SCANLON SCHOLARSHIP

The late Terry Scanlon was born in St. Joseph, Missouri, and raised in El Dorado, Kansas. A graduate of Wichita University in 1956 with a degree in political science, he began an 11-year career with the City of Wichita as administrative assistant in the water department and executive assistant to the city manager. Captivated by politics, he was involved with the Young Democrats at WU, served as Kansas Democratic State Chairman from 1977-1979, and was the finance chairman for the Glickman for Congress Committee. He credited his success to the education he received at WSU, compelling his involvement at many levels, including past president of the Endowment Board of Governors, former member of the Board of Trustees and Alumni Association. Both he and his wife, Doris "D.J.", were President's Club Life Members. In 1986, he established the D.J. and Terry Scanlon Political Science Scholarship as a continuation of his dedication to WSU and his affinity for politics.

R. WESLEY MCCARTY SCHOLARSHIP



Ralph Wesley McCarty graduated summa cum laude from Wichita State University in 1974 with a degree in political science. A compassionate young man, he was considered to have the "soul of Thoreau" by family and friends. While battling leukemia, he maintained both mental and physical strength, even winning first place in a tri-state regional weight lifters meet while undergoing chemotherapy treatment. When he passed away in 1980, his parents wanted to honor the spirit of their son by creating a scholarship reflecting their son's interests and intellect. The R. Wesley McCarty Scholarship was established with the Fairmount College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, honoring the "gentle strength" of this young man.

NEW DEPARTMENT SCHOLARSHIP

Dr. Thomas Phillip Wolf, a Kansas native, graduated from Wichita East High School in 1950. As a student, he was a member of three state championship teams: track, cross country and wrestling. Wolf was captain of the wrestling and cross country teams his senior year.

After high school, Dr. Wolf joined the Marines and served in the Korean War. When he returned home in 1953, he married the former Ella Nora Weigand, also a Kansas native and a graduate of Wichita East High School, with whom he has three children and 10 grandchildren.

Dr. Wolf found his passion for political science at the University of Wichita, where he received his bachelor's in 1959. Continuing his education in that area, he earned his master's degree from Stanford University in 1961.

Dr. Wolf began teaching at the University of New Mexico in 1963. While a professor there, he earned his doctorate degree in 1967, also from Stanford University. He taught at Indiana University Southeast from 1970 until 1999, when he became professor emeritus of political science.

For more than a decade, Mrs. Wolf taught grade school in Jeffersonville, Ind., retiring in 1990. Appreciative of the time he spent as an undergraduate at WU, Dr. Wolf created the Thomas P. and Ella N. Wolf Scholarship in Political Science.
