Presentation: Compassionate Communication in Relationships - An Overview

Concepts based on Marshall Rosenberg's book: Nonviolent Communication (NVC), A Language of Life. This 1 1/2 hour program is an overview of the basic concepts and skills of Compassionate Communication with an interweaving of how that understanding can begin to improve your relationships.

Compassionate Communication's intention is to create a quality of connection with ourselves and with others, to value everyone's needs equally, and to increase understanding, cooperation, and respect within relationships.

Presenter: Molly Traffas, LSCSW, LLC

Molly is a Licensed Specialist Clinical Social Worker, certified in EMDR by the international organization, EMDRIA. "I specialize in the treatment of trauma, and consequently, in the treatment of the frequently associated experiences of low self esteem, chronic relationship difficulties, depression, anxiety, and reoccurring patterns of abuse. Because of the nature of my work, I developed a strong interest in the dynamics of relationships (such as, the relationship to self, the relationship to others, the relationship to the external world), as well as in how to verbalize and communicate effectively without aggression or threat to self or other. This hunger for deeper insight, for healing, for tools or skills to offer, ultimately, led me to the study of Compassionate Communication."
