With winter just around the corner, the tasks and challenges of fall semester are coming to a close. In October, Dr. Bolin, Dr. Lee, and I attended and presented papers at the Annual Program Meeting of the Council on Social Work Education in Portland, Oregon. I also attended the National Association of Deans and Directors of Schools of Social Work (NADD) fall meeting, an all-day meeting held in conjunction with CSWE. This year, I was elected to a three-year term of office as a member of the Board of Directors of NADD. I feel honored to be elected to this office, and, as the director of a small/medium school, I look forward to sharing my perspective with colleagues from the public and



private institutions across the United States. As always, accreditation is a hot topic at the CSWE conference. I was able to attend some sessions addressing various aspects of accreditation, which will be helpful to us as we begin our focused review of the curriculum in preparation for our upcoming reaccreditation review in 2013. This year, Dr. Brien Bolin was accepted for CSWE Site Visitor training, and received that training in Portland. This training and certification allows him to be a member of the CSWE site visit teams and gives him additional knowledge of accreditation requirements. We will undoubtedly benefit from the insight he gains through the training and program visits. Our faculty will begin this process with a retreat on November 19th to review the new accreditation standards and identify the components of our curriculum that address the

requirements of the Educational Policy and Accreditation Standards (EPAS).

Our School's Advisory Board has met regularly through the summer and fall, and I want to thank them for their continuing support of the School. Through their dedicated efforts, the Elwin Barrett Fund continues to move ever closer to the goal of full endowment. The Advisory Board has raised over two-thirds of the \$15,000 needed for endowment! We appreciate their hard work and the donations of the attendees of the Brown Bag Lunches that are sponsored by the Advisory Board.

I want to thank and congratulate our students, staff, faculty, and community partners for a great fall semester and I look forward to seeing you at our Holiday Open House on December 10th!

Student Accomplishments

While the assertion “it is better to give than to receive” is a truth most fitting to those in the practice of social work, I believe I may have underestimated the profound power of receiving, from a client, the simple experience of knowing them. A few short weeks ago a very special gentleman came to my practicum for services. This client was both completely blind and profoundly deaf. I noticed that he was communicating with staff and other clients by having the person use their index finger to individually trace letters into the palm of his hand. He would then respond by writing back into their hand or on paper. I was elated to discover that he also knew sign language, as American Sign Language (ASL) was my choice for foreign language at Wichita State University.



I approached this gentleman and finger-spelled my name while he held the top of my hand. “M-O-L-L-Y,” I introduced myself, and he tried to pronounce my name. He was visibly delighted that someone at the agency knew sign language. He used his hands to scan my arms and hair so he could identify me by touch. Over the span of time this gentleman spent at my practicum, he taught me several new signs or signs I had forgotten. He also spent time getting to know me, while I had the privilege to learn about him. I learned that he loves teaching children sign language. In addition, I learned about his family and favorite past times. Other clients were genuinely attracted to his warm personality, and they spent time getting to know him as well. Everyone grew to care for him in a very exceptional way.

One female client watched as the gentleman client and I signed back and forth. Afterwards, she spoke of how impressed she was by the ability to communicate more easily with sign language.

She had been spending time writing in his palm, while he wrote back to her on paper. She asked where I learned sign language, and I told her about my tutelage at Wichita State. By the time she left my practicum, she informed me that because of her interaction with this gentleman and her ability to observe ASL, she would be switching her college major to Special Education with ASL as her foreign language.

When it was time to discharge this gentleman, I found myself at a loss of words and signs. I wondered how I could possibly convey to him just how extraordinary and memorable my time with him had been. I stumbled through a goodbye, telling him how happy I was to have met him, that I wished him well, and to take good care of himself. I simply did not have the words to tell him what knowing him had meant to me. Two weeks later, while thinking of him still, I found the words: “I will never forget you.” Indeed, what a rare gift I received, in knowing him.

Amy Mohr

Amy Mohr has learned the importance of setting goals, both for her patients and herself, through her co-op position. Mohr is currently working as a substance abuse counselor at [COM-CARE Addictions Treatment Services](#). “I work with adolescent boys at a detention facility and do substance abuse treatment with them. I also complete intakes on adults who are seeking substance abuse treatment,” Mohr said.

Learning about a career in social service has

taught Mohr a great deal about herself. “Co-op has helped me set down clear goals for myself,” Mohr said. “It has helped me examine where I am in my career and what I want to improve on.” Mohr is confident in her job, but she knows she still has a lot to learn. “Co-op has helped me see ways that I can improve and how to approach my supervisor on helping me make these improvements.”

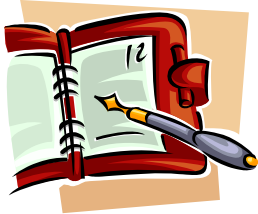

In Memoriam

The School of Social Work mourns the loss of Gloria Tuttle, who passed away on October 8. She was known as “Mrs. Tuttle” to the many students who were awarded Tuttle Scholarships over the last 15 years. The Tuttle Scholarship fund was established in 1994 in honor of her husband, Edward H. Tuttle, who initiated the BSW Program and was the Program’s first Director. Gloria Tuttle was a untiring supporter of the School of Social Work and she took great care and pride in connecting with the students who were the fortunate recipients of the Tuttle undergraduate scholarships and graduate fellowships.
