She has worked as a clinical social worker and provided play therapy at Family Consultation Service, and has worked in Child Protective Services at SRS. She teaches undergraduate research and practice and practicum classes in the program.

By now, I am sure you are all aware of the wonderful news we received this summer:

The MSW Program has been reaccredited for the full eight years!

The reaccreditation effort consumed many hours and we were proud to see our efforts acknowledged by the Council on Social Work Education. As I have said many times, this achievement would not have been possible without the contributions and commitment of our School of Social Work community, which includes faculty, staff, students, community partners, and the administration of Wichita State University. Thanks to all for a great success!

Reaccreditation offers a window of opportunity to grow and to develop new partnerships and initiatives. I am looking forward to exploring new avenues for renewal and growth and to working with all of you again to make the most of this opportunity to expand our programs and offerings.

At the Annual Fall Convocation on September 7, I said the following, which I would like to share with you in this Newsletter:

Former President Bill Clinton has been in the news lately with the release of his new book entitled "Giving"

As the book jacket states, "Giving" is a call to action. It describes how each of us can change the world. It reveals the extraordinary and innovative efforts now being made by companies and organizations—and by individuals—to solve problems and save lives both down the street and around the world. Former President Clinton urges us to seek out what each of us, regardless of income, available time, age, and skills, can do to help, to give people a chance to live out their dreams. He writes about men and women who traded in their corporate careers and the fulfillment they now experience through giving.

He writes about energy-efficient practices, about progressive companies going green, about promoting fair wages and decent working conditions around the world. He shows us how one of the most important ways of giving can be an effort to change, improve, or protect a government policy. He outlines what we as individuals can do, the steps we can take, how much we should consider giving, and why our giving is so important.

"We all have the capacity to do great things," President Clinton says. "My hope is that the people and stories in this book will lift spirits, touch hearts, and demonstrate that citizen activism and service can be a powerful agent of change in the world."

This call for action is necessary, but is old news to social workers. We have been giving and giving for well over 100 years. And we are giving today. As students, you give over 70,000 hours of skilled service to our communities. As professionals you will give the most crucial and important help to the most helpless and hopeless among us. And you do it because of your commitment to the highest ideals of the

human spirit. And you do it without the tangible rewards that others in society take for granted.

There is a joke that says, "you know you're a social worker if people have said to you, I don't know how you do what you do." When people say, I don't know how you do what you do, we take pride in knowing that we do what we do because it needs doing. We do what we do, not as unfeeling robots. We do what we do with full knowledge of the depth of human despair. And yet we do what we do, and we continue to do so in the face of hopelessness. Why do we do it? Somehow, we know that the reward, though often intrinsic, is more than intrinsic.

We know that what we do for others, will, in the end, be as much for us as for them, knowing that we are bound together in a circle of humanity and human need. We can indeed be powerful agents of change in the world, especially as we join with each other professionally and personally.

I have become a fan of the "One Campaign"--the campaign to make poverty history. This Campaign, found online at one.org says:

•"WE BELIEVE that in the best American tradition of helping others help themselves, now is the time to join with other countries in a historic pact for compassion and justice to help the poorest people of the world overcome AIDS and extreme poverty.

•WE COMMIT ourselves - one person, one voice, one vote at a time - to make a better, safer world for all."

I am so proud to be a part of the profession of social work, a profession that is committed to making a better world for all. Aren't you proud too?! Students, future professionals, and educators, I thank you for your commitment to our professional mission and to the mission of the WSU School of Social Work. Together we will make a difference!

Student Highlight Steven Burkhart, MSW Student

This year my practicum is set up through the Ottawa Police Department in Ottawa, KS. I have decided to work on designing a program to benefit the citizens of Ottawa, which is in Franklin County, and most likely four to five surrounding



counties in North East Kansas. The research is desired to determine if a Family Justice Center can be created in rural Kansas. If the program is implemented, the family justice center would provide a wide array of services to assist families in need under one roof.

Currently there are 16 family justice centers in operation in the United States. Most of these centers are in urban areas with the exception of the one in Defiance, OH, which is in a rural area serving several counties. The existing family justice centers provide police, court personnel, mental health, victim advo-

cates, child care, legal assistance, and any other services needed by domestic violence victim in the same building.

The need for this service is very real. Part of the victimization associated with domestic violence is isolation and lack of resources. Many victims do not have the ability to travel all over a town or city to find the services they need. Some may not have transportation, time, or knowledge of services available. With all services under the same roof they are much more accessible to the victim.

The program I plan to develop for Franklin County and other surrounding counties is very similar to the family justice center concept. I hope to work with community organizations as well as local governments to develop a center with advocates from several helping organizations in order to assist anyone with family or home life issues. I plan to have all the services to assist domestic violence victims, but would also like to set it up to where children, teenagers, and parents can receive help or counseling regarding any family problems before they become police matters. The other family is-

sues I hope to address can range from talking to someone about children who are out of control to giving children a safe place they can go if they are threatened or abused in the home.

It is very important to get victims the support they need to escape from dangerous environments. Statistics show an alarming amount of domestic violence ranging from slapping or punching to murder. These already alarming statistics are believed to be very low compared to the actual occurrence of domestic violence because it is often not reported due to fear or the feeling that the system will not help the victim and reporting the violence will make the abuser more aggressive. In addition to helping victims, I feel it is very important to act proactively whenever possible. My plan for a center in Franklin County would meet the needs of domestic violence victims as well as work with families to recognize warning signs and stop the violence and child abuse before it happens.

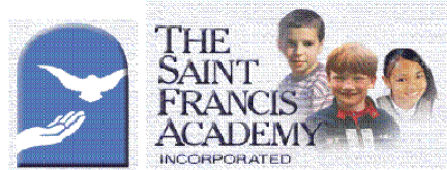
