



Rising Star Syeda Ara

In 2006, **Nisha Weems** was a single parent of three who had recently moved to Wichita from Texas to find a safer place to live for her family. She was underemployed, living on food stamps, and in Section 8 public housing. Nisha lived next door to Wichita State, and she knew that somehow, some way she'd find an opportunity to enroll at WSU. After many struggles, she enrolled in her first class. Her plan was to better herself by getting an associate's degree, but once she started taking gerontology courses she was hooked. Nisha realized that she was pursuing a profession that she was passionate about.

Nisha got help from Student Support Services. "They provided me with a computer because I didn't have one. They provided me with tutoring, especially with algebra. They were my rock." It was Nisha's SSS adviser, Vanessa Souriya-Mnirajd, who gave her advice that made a big difference in her confidence.

In 2011, Nisha graduated cum laude with a bachelor's degree in general studies. In 2013, she finished a master's in aging studies. Today, Nisha has passed her state and federal exams to become the CEO of a nursing facility. She's also looking at the next step to return to Wichita State to pursue doctoral studies in community psychology. "When I stepped away from my comfort zone, there were people to help," she said. "It was never easy, but it did get easier, and better."

**Syeda Ara** is a senior at Wichita State who is majoring in psychology. She chose to attend WSU because it is a place close to her heart and home. She also had knowledge of the many valuable resources that are available at WSU. In 2015, she enrolled in TRIO Student Support Services (SSS) because she needed additional support to achieve her academic and graduation goals.

Syeda has benefitted most from the program's rental system, both electronics and textbooks. She also enjoys meeting with her advisor even when there is nothing major to report. She is active on the WSU campus and in the surrounding neighborhoods. One of her involvements includes serving on the WSU community service board where her focus is meeting the needs of children across Sedgwick County. She also works with the SSS department as a student assistant. She loves this position as it is a way she feels she can give back to the community.

In her free time, she enjoys watching motivational videos that help her to remain focused and active. Syeda is currently working on learning Hindi, her third language. She is fluent in Bangla and English. After she completes her degree, she wants to travel abroad to work and volunteer while further developing her language skills.

## Disability Support Services



**Evan Clifford Jerome Wainwright** joined TRIO Disability Support Services in August 2009. Evan has cerebral palsy and has been an advocate for people with disabilities since he was 15 years old. He graduated from Wichita State in July 2012 with a Bachelor of Arts in criminal justice.

After graduating, Evan decided to move to Atlanta, GA to pursue a career in modeling and acting. He had seen an ad on Facebook<sup>™</sup> about a company that was looking for models. He submitted a photo and short description of himself and a few weeks later he received a message from the company that they were interested in speaking with him about modeling. Of course, he was very pleased and excited at the prospect of working as a model.

He now works for Sunrise Medical as a brand ambassador for Quickie Wheelchairs<sup>®</sup>. The ad campaign featuring him was released in 2017. Evan is a strong advocate for people with disabilities and leads by example to empower others to not put limitations on what they can achieve. He indicates that he is very grateful to Sunrise Medical for giving him a chance to live out one of his career goals. In spite of his disability, Evan refused to give up on his dreams. He says "Never give up on your dreams and believe in yourself."



**Amber Barker** is currently a senior at Wichita State. She joined TRIO Disability Support Services (DSS) in fall 2013 when she was a freshman. Amber is working toward a degree in social work and expects to graduate in 2018. When asked how TRIO DSS has helped her, Amber said that TRIO DSS is great about arranging tutoring assistance for her in math and writing. She also indicated that her advisors shared ways on how to obtain textbooks for her classes.

Amber's journey at Wichita State has not been easy. There have been several times where she has struggled through difficulties related to her disability. Fortunately, Amber was assured that she has a strong support system through the Office of Disability Services and DSS.

Recently, Amber lost her job and visited with her TRIO DSS advisor for assistance. The advisor helped Amber with job searches, editing her resume, and helped her with devising a cover letter for a new job in the social work field. Within two weeks Amber was able to start a new job with a company that assists children with behavioral issues to further their independence and ultimately improve the quality of their daily lives.


## **Upward Bound Math Science**



**Violet Gomes** is the Upward Bound Math Science (UBMS) alumnus of the year because of her diligence and example. Violet was admitted into UBMS in 1996 as a high school sophomore and participated until her graduation in 1999. Upon her arrival at the summer program she announced that she was "Violet, like the flower, not the color" and she immediately gained credibility with her peers and the staff as a young woman with a voice and plan. This powerhouse of a student from Iowa took the opportunities provided by TRIO and changed her life. Violet matriculated to Wichita State where she completed her bachelor's degree in nursing. During her time at WSU, she served as a staff assistant for UBMS for nearly 10 years.

Since leaving UBMS, Violet has worked as a nurse specializing in medical telemetry, a clinical nurse in the pulmonary and cardiac unit, and is currently using her earned master's degree as clinical nurse manager at the Leavenworth County Health Department where she oversees clinical staff, mediates public health records and communicates with state entities.

Violet will complete a doctorate as a family nurse practitioner in May of 2020, through Fort Hays State University. While Violet readily attributes her academic success to her TRIO participation, she also met her husband of 18 years, Barry Gomes, during her time at Wichita State. Together they live in Kansas City with their three children.



**David Nevarez** is a four-year Upward Bound Math Science Center participant. He is a junior at Sumner Academy, an International Baccalaureate student, and a member of the University of Kansas Talent Search Program.

## McNair Scholars Program



Christa thrives on cultivating safe spaces and rich learning opportunities for students, staff, and faculty. Her future goals are to marry her passion for research, teaching, and advocacy in a senior level administration position in order to support student retention and academic success.

Tyson wishes to thank Veterans Upward Bound and every single human-being that has lifted a fellow veteran up and helped them succeed.



She influenced my decision to choose the same major. I graduated with a BSEE from Wichita State and I'm currently enrolled at WSU in the master's of science degree program in electrical engineering. He is a native of Wichita and graduated from South High School. His long-term goals include earning a master's in electrical engineering, pursuing an MBA at WSU next fall, and eventually acquiring a PhD in electrical engineering. ## Kansas Kids @ GEAR UP



Jonathan subsequently obtained his juris doctorate from the University of Kansas School of Law. He currently resides in New York City where he advises on tax law matters for Macquarie Bank.

According to Jonathan, "KKGU provides the foundation and guidance for those underserved populations which have not been given this foundation. This foundation allows young people to focus on schooling and career development with the financial certainty that would have otherwise been their sole focus. I am extremely grateful KKGU was there to provide me with this foundation which I have benefitted from as I work to build upon it every day."



**Destiny** became part of Kansas Kids @ GEAR UP in August 2014. Destiny has always been a very outgoing person and has made the best of her situation. She has been fortunate that her placements have all been fairly longterm. She is living with a family who adopted one of her younger siblings. She is currently in the adoption process.

Destiny is in the eleventh grade and has a 3.5 grade point average. She has taken IB, AP and honors classes and is involved in several clubs including Key Club, Christians on Campus and Sign Language Club. Destiny enjoys volunteering in her community as well. She has over 30 community service hours for First Call for Help. She volunteers doing sign language interpreting and is only a few months shy of becoming a legal sign interpreter. This accomplishment will make her tri-lingual.

Destiny believes that GEAR UP has helped her to evaluate her college decisions. She feels that with the help of GEAR UP she will be able to attend the college of her choice and feels that GEAR UP has helped her see that she is not limited by the "foster kid standards" in people's minds.
