


ABOUT GEAR UP














NATIONAL GEAR UP DAY









National GEAR UP Day event took place on September 25, 2019 at Century II Performing Arts Center. Nearly 1,500 students in the seventh and eighth grade from Haysville Middle School and Haysville West Middle School, and students with Kansas Kids GEAR UP attended this event.

The conference themed "The GEAR UP Code" focused around characteristics of GEAR UP and how these characteristics could be applied to life. The powerful message about commitment from keynote speaker, Alex Sheen with "Because I Said I Would," set the tone for the day. Students made personal commitments on "promise cards" provided by the "Because I Said So" organization.

Participants then enjoyed a three-course catered meal. Musical entertainment by Contempo was provided. A meal etiquette lesson by Kianga Crowley of Simly a Lady Co. gave students tips and tricks on how to properly dine.

The students then went to nine separate rooms for workshops. Each student was able to attend two workshops. Each workshop focused on the characteristics of the GEAR UP code. Workshops were put on by many GEAR UP friends and advocates:





- Paradigm Shift Code of Engagement introduced GEAR UP to students in a memorable way. Through music and games, this workshop aimed to kickstart a college-going culture by sharing personal college experiences.
- Ron Lewis Got G.R.I.T?? This session was designed to give students a foundation on how to develop G.R.I.T. (guts, resilience, intensity, and tenacity) in and out of the classroom.
- Patty Stuever 8 to Great. This workshop focused on transforming lives to reach full potential while maintaing pesonal power.
- Social Etiquette Kianga Crowley Students learned about a movement to improve the way leaders are emotionally developed, how employees treat customers and how to bring a sense of cultural awareness to daily interactions.
- Entrepreneurship Andrea Stang used past experiences, to teach students how to build a brand in their community quickly, efficiently and sustainably.
- Show Me the Money Tim Rogers and Ryan Lee helped students improve their financial lives and walked through some simple planning ideas.
- Cracking the Career Code Maggie Slack taught students the secrets of finding a job, building a resume and successful job interviewing skills.
- Switching Codes for Survival Harold Wallace III inspired students to become more passionate about their future academic success.
- Code of Honor Alex Sheen shared his perspectives on promises and gave opportunities for questions.
