Here are six things that students can expect in middle school:



- For many students, going to middle school means going to a different and bigger school, new teachers, classmates, and friends are things students will have to adapt to.
  - New things to adjust to such as lockers, changing classes, different teachers for each class, more homework, and different expectations in each class.
    - The classes are more difficult, which causes academic stress, and students are expected to work on their own.

Program Educational Advisor Thip Phichith conducted an ACT informational workshop on April 28<sup>th</sup> in the library at Southeast High School. Nine sophomores attended. A PowerPoint presentation was used to cover test-taking tips and guessing strategies to help students better prepare for the ACT. In this workshop, students also learned what the ACT test consists of, when to take the ACT, how to register for the ACT, ACT test dates, registration deadlines, and how the ACT is scored. Tutoring resources were also provided. At the end of the presentation, students logged in to their laptops to play a fun game that Phichith created using Blooket. The game consisted of eight math questions relevant to the practice ACT test. The students enjoyed playing the game and had a wonderful time. At the end of the session, students were given a workshop evaluation to complete before their dismissal. Below are the results from the student evaluations. Phichith plans to do more ACT prep workshops at Southeast for the new school year.

# **College Scorecard**

As students begin exploring college options, it is important to identify which option works best for them. The College Scorecard tool at <a href="https://collegescorecard.ed.gov">https://collegescorecard.ed.gov</a> can assist students in researching potential colleges. Whether students choose to pursue a certificate program, two-year associate degree, or a four-year bachelor's degree, postsecondary education is expensive even with financial aid. Therefore, every student should carefully consider the criteria specific to their needs: college type, admission requirements, majors, location, total cost, financial aid, institution size, and community engagement opportunities.

During the academic year, TRIO Talent Search partners with TRIO Talent Search-South to offer campus visits to high school students. Campus visits are a vital part of the decision-making process. They allow students to explore campus facilities, such as the residence halls, food options, admissions, and financial aid. It is an opportunity to interact with current students/faculty/staff and gain a better understanding of the campus culture beyond the tailored brochure.
