Summer Tips for Juniors To Prepare for Senior Year Suresh Menon, Program Educational Advisor

Enroll in summer school to get ahead or make up classes, take courses on-line or enroll at a community college.

Visit the local library. Check out a book to improve reading, writing and vocabulary skills. A librarian can help find books on careers to pursue.

Consider taking the pre-ACT or PSAT tests.

Get a part-time job or volunteer. This builds confidence, looks good on a resume, and improves communication and leadership skills.

Learn the importance of managing money and preparing a budget.

Uncover potential career interests:

- List all the ways free time is spent. Think of activities enjoyed throughout a typical day and which ones are motivational.
- Determine which subjects are of greatest interest. Create a list of favorite high school subjects and courses where grades are the highest. This can help inspire students to align their interests with their skills.
- Identify strengths. Ask teachers, counselors, friends and family what they think and be open to feedback. Take career aptitude tests to assess what profession is best suited for the student considering their personality, skills, interests, and values.
- <u>Explore the Occupational Outlook Handbook</u> (<u>https://www.bls.gov/ooh/</u>) to gain information on various types of jobs, training and educational requirements, working conditions, job outlook, and earnings.
- **Explore trends.** The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics usually lists the top fastest-growing occupations along with salary information. This can help to narrow down career options and identify a list of potential careers to explore further.
- **Engage help.** Get advice on career options from the high school counselor, a college career counselor, or a TRIO Talent Search program educational advisor.

Research colleges, technical schools, and internships.

Pay attention to size, location, admissions requirements, if they offer courses of interest, housing options, social climate, and overall atmosphere. Utilize services offered by TRIO Talent Search or contact a college career counselor to learn more. Don't forget to ask about financial aid.



Volunteering for Scholarships Emily Roets-Estevez, Program Educational Advisor

Even when school is not in session, there are still ways to prepare for scholarship applications. Most scholarships first consider a student's grades (i.e. GPA), but there are other factors that scholarship committees look at when deciding who to give funds to. One of these factors is volunteer service.

When a student volunteers, they demonstrate a desire to give back to their community. By volunteering over the summer, a student also shows that they are willing to utilize their own free time to help others, which can set them apart from other students who stay home over the break. A resource for finding local volunteer opportunities is the United Way Volunteer Center (<u>https://</u><u>unitedwayplains.galaxydigital.com/need/</u>).



This online tool lets volunteers search for opportunities based on their skills and interests and connects them with the event's organizer. This website also tracks volunteer hours, so students can download a PDF of their service to attach to scholarship applications. However, a volunteer does not need to utilize this website to track their volunteer hours; instead, they can keep a running Word document with the date of volunteer service, the number of hours of service, the name of the organization, a quick description of the service performed, and the contact information of the event organizer. Have a safe and productive summer break and reach out to an advisor for assistance with finding volunteer opportunities.



Understanding the ACT Thip Phichith, Program Educational Advisor

The ACT is the American College Test. This standardized test is used by most colleges and universities to determine admissions qualifications. It contains four sections of multiple-choice questions, including English, math, reading, and science.

The full test is around three hours long. Students that are currently enrolled in 10th, 11th or 12th grade can take the ACT. Taking the ACT makes students more visible to colleges and gives them an edge for scholarship competitions across the country. TRIO Talent Search can provide up to four fee waivers for eligible students. Fee waivers cover registration and late fees for either the ACT test with a writing test or the one without writing.

Students who are most likely to meet eligibility requirements include those enrolled in 11th or 12th grade and those who meet one or more of the indicators for economic need; for example, those participating in a free or reduced school lunch program (based on the income levels established by the U.S. Department of Agriculture). 
The ACT offers a college admissions test, college course placement, and a career planning component.

Talent Search offered nine campus visits to the students this year, including Emporia State University, WSU Tech, Kansas State University, University of Kansas, Newman University, Wichita State University, Cowley College, Butler Community College, and Oklahoma State University.
