## Things to remember

- All campuses across the country are facing accessibility challenges.
- WSU is in a special position because of the nature of the agreement with the NFB.
- The WSU/NFB agreement is not the only one of its kind.
- Accessibility is not the same as accommodation.
  - Accessibility is proactive and benefits populations.
  - o Accommodations are reactive and benefit individuals with specified needs.
- All federal money coming from the Department of Education is subject to Section 504 requirements and is overseen by the Office of Civil Rights (OCR).
- Disability harassment is serious, and it is WSU's responsibility to respond.
  - Harassment includes advising a person to take a different class or pursue a different major on the basis of a disability (real or perceived) alone. Creating accessible materials
- Focus on moving forward in an accessible way.
- Using Microsoft products supplied by the university ensures you have the appropriate tools and support you need.
- Digital documents and face-to-face delivery need to be accessible.
- Consider accessibility when choosing textbooks.
